

Fire alarm system and preventive measures 💧 📐

We take fire safety to the highest level, and we want to give some tips on how you can avoid triggering the alarm in your home or communal kitchen:

Many live in smaller apartments

Here, the distance from the kitchen to the fire detector may be shorter, and the tenant must be extra careful to ensure adequate ventilation in the home when cooking in the kitchen. All our fire detectors are set according to the correct requirements and are connected to automatic notification.

Do not leave the kitchen until the food is ready

When you start cooking, you are responsible for monitoring this until the food is finished and the stove is turned off. If you forget the food and there is high heat and smoke, the fire alarm will go off.

Make sure to ventilate well and use the kitchen fan

Always use the kitchen fan while cooking and feel free to put up a window if the kitchen fan does not remove all the steam/smoke from cooking. When using electrical items such as waffle irons, toasters and rice cookers, place these under or near the cooker hood. If you find that the kitchen fan does not have a good enough draft, you must report this to the caretaker for a check.

Cleanliness is important!

Make sure that the oven and hotplates are clean of food residues and spills, as this can be a fire hazard and contribute to the rapid development of smoke. Therefore, wipe the hotplates and oven after you have placed food.

The fire detector must never be touched or removed

If a fire detector is dismantled or an attempt is made to remove it, we will receive a notification of a fault in the system and specifically which fire detector, and Securitas or a janitor will go to the residence in question. The tenant will receive a warning and a fee for this. If your fire detector goes into alarm, you must therefore <u>not</u> touch the fire detector under any circumstances.

Covering a fire detector can be fatal

This must <u>not</u> occur under any circumstances and leads to errors that cause the system to not work in the event of a fire, and you put yourself and other residents in danger. Covering a fire detector is considered a breach of contract and entails a written warning and a fee. Do you have problems with the fire detector going off often when you are cooking? Submit an inquiry to the janitor for a check of the kitchen fan and advice.
